**Budgeting** means you have a set amount of money and you have to decide how you are going to spend it so you can cover all of your expenses for your **needs**, and have some left over for your **wants**. Adults have to plan a budget for things like rent, car payments, groceries, and the electricity bill. It can be really complicated! Are there any characters in your book who had to figure out how to stretch their money?

To practice budgeting, let's plan a class party! You have **\$100** to cover the expenses for your party.
